




A DEDICATION TO OUR ALUMNI

The Majestic Lower Garden — setting for commencement exercises, numerous college activities and many a wedding — will remain a place for pleasant memories.




HERMAN L. HOEH A.B., 1951, M.A., 1953 Minister

The unquenchable thirst for knowledge of this pioneer student led to his graduation with honors. Since graduation, he has traveled extensively in Europe, Africa and Asia. RICHARD D. ARMSTRONG, A.B., 1952 Minister








DR. C. PAUL MEREDITH, M.A., 1953 *Minister*

KENNETH C. HERRMANN, A.B., 1953




MARION J. McNAIR, A.B., 1953




HERBERT BURK McNAIR, A.B., 1954 Minister

GEORGE A. MEEKER, Jr., A.B., 1954 Minister



PAUL B. SMITH, A.B., 1954






JIMMY L. FRIDDLE, Jr., A.B., 1955 Minister

ELVA EMILY SEDLIACIK, A.B., 1955








DAVID JON HILL, A.B., 1955 Minister

A dynamic personality, and the ability to persuade are invaluable assets of this minister. His wife, Audrey, is a great help in his ministry.







As a senior, Mary Jo divided her time between studies and Assistant Librarian and Receptionist duties. After a year of secretarial work she found her present position as a homemaker.



The rare jewel of balance between humor and seriousness aids him in his leadership of the Gladewater, Texas and Minden, Louisiana Churches.












PERSONNEL










