Radio London Broadcasts World Tomorrow Tape

January, 1965 has already shown tremendous growth in the Work of God! On January 5, 11:00 a.m. Pacific Standard Time (7:00 p.m. Greenwich Mean Time), the first tape of The World Tomorrow broadcast was beamed into the British Isles over Radio London. Radio London is a 50,000 watt broadcasting unit mounted on a Panamanian ship anchored

in the Thames River Estuary. In this way many different broadcasts from many companies can be aired in Britain without being subject to some of the strict regulations of the British Broadcasting Corporation. They are going out under a Panama license, but being made available to all of the people in the British Isles.

This is truly a blessing for the British people. Never before has God's Truth been so easily accesible for so many Britons. Although this one station alone represents a tremendous expense, yet its value for all of Ephraim is higher by far than its price to us. As Mr. Armstrong stated, at last some of the cobwebs are going to be swept from a few of the British minds.

By the middle of the year the present once per week broadcast will be increased to seven nights a week, straight across the board, at 7:00 p.m., their time!

Such a blessing is truly a gigantic step forward in God's Work for the people in Great Britain. We can surely be looking for much more growth in this Work in that area of the world.


colors there are a stunning combination of coral and gold.



God has answered the prayers of the San Bernardino Church. After an exhaustive months-long search for a better hall the Italian American Club, 9435 Olive Street in Fontana was located.

In March, 1958 a small handfull of people began attending services in Redlands and formed the nucleus of what has now become the NEW Fontana Church. In 1962 growth and location necessitated a move to larger quarters and we became the San Bernardino Church. The old 100F Building with its steep, interminable stairway prevented many of the aged and afflicted from regular attendance and so began the search which led to our new place.

Dr. Clint Zimmerman, Pastor of the Church, stated, "The new hall is much more cheery, comfortable, handy and adaptable than our previous meeting place. It provides a better setting all around and the entire congregation is well-pleased with the new building."

On January 8, this hall also became available for us to have our own *Bible Study!!*

The new meeting place—situated at ground level, making it much more accessible for the approximately 275 members—is located just a few blocks north of the San Bernardino Freeway. Take the Sierra Street turnoff and travel north to the United Steel Workers of America (USWA) Hall. Turn into the parking lot of that hall and proceed east to the Italian American Club on Olive Street. The two buildings share a common parking lot.


